## Virtue Exercise

Aristotle believed that virtuous people make morally right decisions, which inherently lead to human happiness.

Your partner design team has two choices in a capacity expansion – both meet all legal/regulatory guidelines:

1. A simple bio pond meets regs, but will create a noticeable odor outside the plant.
2. A complex water treatment system won't smell, but makes the project unprofitable and hence won't be built.

### **Part 1:**

You and your partner both embody the virtue that you value protecting the environment.

- Applying Aristotelian ethics, what is the right (i.e. ethical) decision?

### **Part 2:**

Now, you both also embody a virtue that values prosperity, and

- The expansion will create jobs that raise 50 families out of poverty.

Now what is the ethical decision?

### **Part 3:**

Same expansion, but different virtues. One of you is a fervent free market capitalist; the other an environmental zealot. The two of you must report out a single decision.

Now what is the ethical decision?
